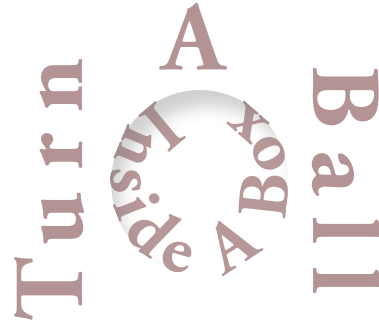

WNT Hands-on Demonstrator *for* May 2011



Cindy Drozda will be our Spring Demonstrator/Hands-on Instructor from April 30th-May 5th. Cindy is recognized all over the world as an artist and excellent demonstrator/instructor.

My Philosophy:

The more we are exposed to different methods and ideas, the more we expand our own horizons. The energy that you give your club by providing the members with a program of non-local demonstrators brings a world of ideas to your group! My professional woodworking career of over 30 years includes full time woodturning since 1996. The elegant lidded vessels that I am known for are exhibited at the finest Galleries and Art Shows in the country. I demonstrate and teach a variety of woodturning projects at symposia, guilds, and clubs around the country. My program can be custom designed to fit your club's meeting schedule, and the skill level of the workshop participants. What I do best is teach precise woodturning technique and design to all levels through a series of projects that are designed to provide exercise in both turning and design skills.

Demonstrations:

I always put together an exciting program full of techniques, tips, tricks, and ideas! My presentations include informative handouts on the subject, plus a source list. I like to put variety into my presentations; even if someone has seen me before they will see something new. To give the symposium or club meeting attendees 110%, I go out of my way to make myself accessible to everyone before, during, and after the event for advice, problem solving, or socializing. I am also available by email for further questions in the future. An all-day demonstration usually consists of 2 - 3 separate topics, with a break in between. The demonstration can be a preview or review of the projects taught in the hands-on sessions

The tuition for each of the hands-on classes is \$125 per day which is due at the time you register. You may register for as many days as you wish as long as there is an opening. Classes will be limited to six per class. Since the hands-on classes should fill up very rapidly, be sure to sign up as soon as you can. Registration will be limited to WNT members until March 31st. If there are any spaces still available after the club meeting on March 31st, registration will be open to anyone who would like to attend a hands-on class with Cindy Drozda.

There will be an **all-day demonstration on Saturday, April 30th** at the R. D. Evans Community Center starting at 9 AM and ending about 4 PM. The fee for the Saturday demo is \$10 at the door.

1 day

Learn to have a light touch and careful aim, and the confidence to make thin, delicate turnings. Challenging and inspiring - for any skill level.

Finial Turning Intensive

Monday, May 2nd

1 day

Get started in Woodturning! Learn basic techniques while making a vase, bowl, or other project. No woodturning experience is necessary. This class is an excellent "tune-up" for experienced turners!

Woodturning Essentials

Tuesday, May 3rd

1 day

Using multiple centers, a triangular shape is created on the lathe. This class covers the layout technique and some ways to use it to enhance turned projects. We will create a Triangular Box, combining multi-axis technique with basic box-making techniques.

Triangular Box and other Multi-Axis spindle projects

Wednesday & Thursday, May 4th & 5th

2 days

The subject of this class is my "signature" style of lidded container with a finial; my most popular demonstration and workshop subject. Students are guided through the techniques and procedures involved in this project. The study of tools and technique, and the complexity of the box(es) and finial can be adjusted to make this a two day class.

Subject: Pen Turning Videos

This month we have a donation by one of our members, Robert Richards, of two videos on pen turning. I wanted to add these two videos to the library but you know those round "TUIs" they are hard to come by. Lucky for me Robert found one, "Thank you Robert!"

The two videos are Turning Pens with Kip & Rex, otherwise known as Kip Christensen and Rex Burningham. Video I: The Basics and Beyond and Video II: More Pens Plus Tips & Tricks. The first video is 1 hour and 8 minutes long and the duration of the second video is 1 hour and 28 minutes. All of the pens are turned on a variable speed Jet mini-lathe but the material presented will work on almost all lathes. If you have an older lathe without a Morse taper a different type of mandrel is required and they give no suggestions for this situation.

In the first video they start with a slimline pen kit which is probably the most readily available and the one most new turners utilize in starting pen turning. It is the one I used at first but I now recommend the Sierra style for a beginner as it is much easier to assemble and only requires one piece of wood instead of two required by the slimline. Plus you can get two pens from one pen blank using the Sierra style.

The slimline is undoubtedly the most versatile and offers many design opportunities for modifying the basic kit. Both videos show many examples of design opportunities in modifying a pen kit. Wood selection, blank preparation, turning tools, turning techniques, sanding, finishing, and assembly are all well covered. If you have never turned a pen, the information in these two videos will save you countless problems in starting along the pen turning path.

There are detailed instructions for making, finishing, and assembling the slimline pen with tips on how to wire burn grooves, adding finger grooves to the tip end of the pen, making a pen without the centerband, and even adding an antler centerband to the slimline pen. There is a detailed discussion about the various types of materials used in pen making including a discussion of what type of antler not to use and where is the best location to cut a section from an antler.

In the second video some of the more advanced kits are shown, such as the European style and the American style in a rollerball and a fountain pen. Techniques for turning plastic are discussed and they even turn an antler pen. The tips and tricks section is very well done and includes a sliding table for crosscutting, drilling jigs and tip, barrel trimmers, how to repair defects in wood, assembly jigs, and even tips on how to disassemble a pen. While the information presented is priceless in the value a new pen turner may obtain; there were some things that were a little disconcerting. The audio has a lot of variation in the sound level, and this distracted from the material being presented. In Video I the minilathe had a clicking problem that was most annoying (luckily it disappeared in Video II). The introduction was the same in both videos and the discussion on antlers was also repeated. If I was buying two different videos, I would not appreciate having to listen to the same material all over again. Thanks to Robert, I did not have to buy any videos. But aside from these minor complaints the videos are full of great information on how to avoid many of the pitfalls that beginning pen turners may fall into. Don't ask me how I know this.

Smithfield Elementary School Fine Arts Day Project

On Friday, January 21st, nine members of the Woodturners of North Texas brought six mini lathes to the Smithfield Elementary School Fine Arts Day event in North Richland Hills where four different classes of



fourth and fifth grade students turned and finished candle sticks under the supervision of the nine instructor/coaches. In each session emphasis was placed on safety by insisting that each student wear safety glasses and a dust mask while working at the lathe.



The students then



turned the material that had been prepared by Glynn Cox, John Lauderbaugh, John Horn, and Ronnie Nuzum. The students made candle sticks of their own design with the supervision of their coaches. During the oral presentation in the sessions, the turnings of the instructors were shown and each turner told about some of the features of the particular items the students were viewing. Since many schools today no longer teach wood

shop classes, we felt it was important that the students be exposed to the joys of woodturning. As a result of our efforts, we were able to see some of the students' parents that expressed an interest in finding out more about the WNT and possibly becoming a member of the organization.

The Fine Arts Day program at the school is held each year to give the students hands



on experience in a variety of artistic activities that are not available in their normal curriculum. The various sessions included painting, dancing, balloon art, music, pottery, and other "fine art" activities.



Binion Elementary School Fine Arts Day Project

One of the objectives of the Woodturners of North Texas is to introduce people to the art and craft of woodturning. By starting with children at



the elementary school level, we strive to inspire young people in the joy of producing objects on the lathe. On February 18th, at the Binion Elementary School in
