## Turning OSB Boards by Greg Stehle



I am about to retire from a career as an Engineer and Lean Six Sigma Master Black Belt in the Aerospace, Automotive and Medical industries. I have been doing some form of woodworking since starting in my late teens in my parent's basement. Today I am blessed to have a good sized, well equipped shop thanks to the support of my wife Kathy.

Kathy actually got me started in woodturning in a serendipitous way. She had gone to Woodcraft to sign up for a scroll saw class and saw a flyer for WNT that said members received a 10% discount there. We were spending enough at Woodcraft to have a net benefit from the membership so she sent in the membership form. In the meantime, she signed up for a bowl turning class at Woodcraft, and shortly after we bought our first lathe, a Jet 16-42. Kathy started receiving the club newsletter, and come December 2014 we decided to attend the club Christmas party.

We were amazed at the pieces that were auctioned at the Christmas party, and we really enjoyed the fellowship, so we decided to start attending the meetings, with me as the spouse in tow. In July 2015 I joined the club, and haven't looked back. Since that time, I have taken in-person turning instruction at the Homestead in Elm Mott, from John Horn, Jimmy Clewes, Stuart Batty and Nick Cook. I have also attended numerous demos at SWAT, the annual AAW symposium, and online.

The demos and in-person instruction taught me something about technique, but viewing the galleries at SWAT and the AAW, and art shows and art galleries taught me about form and alternative materials. I saw my first segmented piece at SWAT and was so fascinated that I launched into creating segmented pieces with the help of Malcolm Tibbetts's book and videos. I happened to see a turned OSB piece at the Cottonwood Arts festival a few years ago, and although it was interesting, I thought I could do better. I bought a 4'x8' sheet of OSB from Lowes for around \$20 and started making bowls and hollow forms. Perhaps because of the Engineer in me I liked the idea of planning and building a piece up, as opposed to searching for the almighty big, monolithic, perfect piece of beautifully figured wood that would make my work look great!

Since starting segmenting and OSB projects, I have added urethane casting, and alabaster turning to my project materials. I still enjoy simple bowl turning, and recently have been working on expanding my knowledge and abilities with finishes.

I believe that if you really love doing something it is not a hobby, so when people ask me if I have any hobbies, I prefer to say I really love woodturning!

# To MY BUSINESS or NOT To MY BUSINESS - A Good Computer App Question

Not certain anyone would want to use this app unless you were in a small business and/or an online business (Like in an Etsy store). That being said, I shall continue. I have needed an app (free, of course) for my tablet that usually is in the shop with me. If I get phone calls or a text, I can access it immediately without having to go in and fire up the computer in the office (inside the house - not in the shop.) The one that works on my Android-powered tablet is entitled: *My Business*.

This app from the Google Play Store (maybe one like it for the Apple) is an inventory database with the capability for an item's photos, purchase price (if you did purchase the materials OR the object), the sales price, name, and even a KEY (mine is totally numeric) that you can take a picture of the barcode you affix to your items for sale. (I have no barcodes, that is why mine is simply numeric.) It keeps it all neatly in a sorted order you determine and the information is easily accessible. You can even export the information/figures to a .csv format for Excel or even a catalog in a .pdf format.

Obviously, if you are not into the business end of turning and turn only for fun, this is nothing you want. HOWEVER, if you are toying with the idea (or doing more than toying with the idea) you might want to check this application out. I mean, it does have my favorite word "FREE" in it. Put that together with your Square program for taking plastic and you are set to handle most anything coming across your table. It can even do receipts and invoices. True, I have something else on my "big" machine in the office, but to have this in the shop available at all times is very handy. I have needed an application to keep up with my inventory of products, mainly turning, but I also have flat work like cutting boards and cheese board, not to mention furniture.

Try it, you might even like it. If not, it is still easy to delete apps on a tablet.

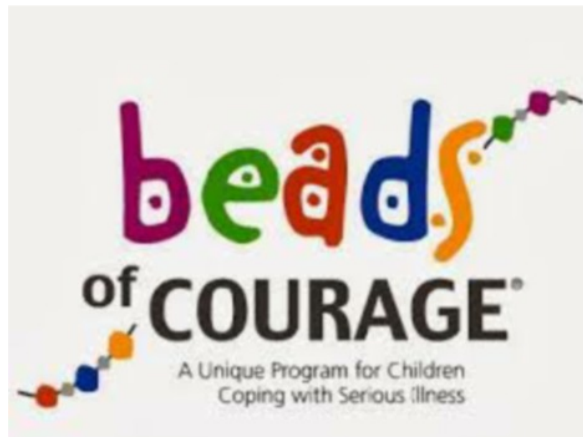

## Beads of Courage Program

This program is designed to support, strengthen and encourage children and families coping with serious illness. The program lets the children tell their story using colorful beads as meaningful symbols that commemorates milestones they have achieved along their treatment path. The average child gets 500 beads. The Woodturners of North Texas is taking on the challenge again this year.

## Requirements

The lidded box/bowl interior diameter should be 6” (5” minimum diameter, 6” depth, 4” minimum). The lid should have a finial/knob that is easy for a child to grasp and not too elaborate. The ‘Beads of Courage’ logo bead to be placed inside or outside will be available at the meeting or can be mailed to you upon request. The “Beads of Courage” inscription can also be engraved or burned in the lid and can be placed inside or outside of the lid (no political or religious undertones are accepted). Customarily your box or bowl will be taken to SWAT and displayed along with the others from the club. Your thanks is knowing a very ill child is getting something that will help them through difficult times.
